JUSTICE calls on Lords to decriminalise child victims of sexual exploitation

JUSTICE, the all-party law reform and human rights group, today called upon the House of Lords to end the criminalisation of victims of child prostitution.

Peers will today debate an amendment to the Policing and Crime Bill which would mean that children could no longer be prosecuted for 'loitering or soliciting for the purposes of prostitution'. Those who control, coerce and sexually exploit child victims of child prostitution will still be guilty of serious offences under the Sexual Offences Act 2003.

Sally Ireland, Senior Legal Officer (Criminal Justice) at JUSTICE, said:

We need to send out a clear message to children who are being exploited in this way that if they come forward they will receive help, support and protection from the law - and need have no fear of being prosecuted. This outdated offence should be abolished.

Notes to editors:

- 1. The Policing and Crime Bill is currently in Committee stage in the House of Lords. Amendment 65, tabled by Baroness Miller of Chilthorne Domer (Liberal Democrat); the Earl of Onslow (Conservative) and Baroness Stern (Crossbench) would amend section 1 of the Street Offences Act 1959 so that children and young people under 18 could no longer be prosecuted for 'loitering or soliciting for the purposes of prostitution'.
