He was responding to the current coalition government's commitment to a 'full programme of measures to reverse the substantial erosion of civil liberties and roll back state intrusion'. The Conservative—Liberal Democrat coalition has also committed itself to a review of the Human Rights Act.

The current political circumstances are unique and this event will consider the implications of recent proposals and commitments for the future of civil liberties and human rights, both domestically and within the EU. JUSTICE experts will lead a discussion that will bring you right up to date with issues important to you.
