It has been a year where the role of the Court of Protection has been in the spotlight. Capacity and liberty has again been at the forefront of recent jurisprudence, with the Supreme Court decision in P & Cheshire West. Disability, dignity and resource allocation reached Strasbourg in McDonald v UK. Practice points, including the impact of changes to legal aid, will be covered by leaders in their field.
